




One day, Heron was looking for food on the reef.

Then he flew home.




The next day, Heron was walking along a beach looking for food.

Then, he pulled out the fence posts with his beak.




In the morning, the people came to get the turtles.

They know that herons and turtles are living things.

They know that living things need food, air, and water.

Food

When herons hunt for food, they are being predators.
They are looking for prey.


Predators are animals that hunt and eat other animals.

The animals they eat are their prey.



Air

Sea turtles can stay underwater for a long time, but they still need to breathe air.



Water

Turtles and seabirds need to drink water, but some don't need fresh water like we do. They can drink seawater.

Some turtles and herons have a salt gland just behind each eye.
It gets rid of the salt from the water they drink.
