





RESULTS OF THE BALKAN WARS

Though none of the Great Powers had been involved, the results of these two Balkan wars were profound. In the first place, Turkey was now at last reduced in Europe to regions racially Turkish. Secondly, all Balkan Powers obviously regarded the Treaty of Bucharest as something to be consigned to the waste paper basket at the first opportune moment. None of them saw the settlement as permanent, all were ready for another war before long and in particular Bulgaria nursed grievances against Serbia and Greece. Thirdly, the great gains made by Serbia filled her with confidence and inspired her with ambition to unite all remaining Serbs in the Balkans under her rule. In particular, she was brought even more sharply into collision with Austria Hungary, partly because that country had taken the lead in denying her Albania and partly because Austria and Hungary between them ruled about six million Serbs and Croats, including the million Serbs of Bosnia Herzegovina

QUESTION 4: Gandhi and modern India – 1915-1947

Part A: Resource Interpretation (10 marks)

The Committee feels that it is no longer justified in holding the nation back from endeavouring to assert its will against an imperialist and authoritarian Government which dominates over it and prevents it from functioning in its own interest and in the interest of humanity. The Committee resolves, therefore, to sanction for the vindication of India's inalienable right to freedom and independence the starting of a mass struggle on nonviolent lines on the widest possible scale, so that the country might utilize all the non-violent strength it has gathered during the last twenty two years of peaceful struggle. Such a struggle must inevitably be under the leadership of Gandhi and the Committee requests him to take the lead and guide the nation in the steps to be taken.








THE LAHORE RESOLUTION 1940


In 1918 Japan was in a strong position in the Far East

She had a powerful navy, a great deal of influence in China, and had benefited economically from the First World War, while the states of Europe were busy fighting each other. Japan took advantage of the situation both by providing the Allies with shipping and other goods, and by stepping in to supply orders, especially in Asia, which the Europeans could not fulfil. During the war years, her export of cotton cloth almost trebled, while her merchant fleet doubled in tonnage. Politically her course seemed set for democracy when in 1925 all adult males were given a vote. Hopes were soon dashed: at the beginning of the 1930s the army assumed control of the government





'The declaration, made in the names of Britain, America and China, called for unconditional surrender of Japan, to be followed by military occupation, demilitarization and loss of territory. This left little prospect of the kind of settlement which the uncommitted in Japan, especially in the services, might have been persuaded to accept. Indeed, it brought a temporary closing of the ranks behind those who were willing to go down fighting. This, however, lasted only for about a week. On August 6, 1945, the first atom bomb was dropped on Hiroshima and three days later another destroyed most of Nagasaki, the second coming less than 24 hours after a Russian declaration of war upon Japan. To the great majority, these events made surrender imperative – and at once'
